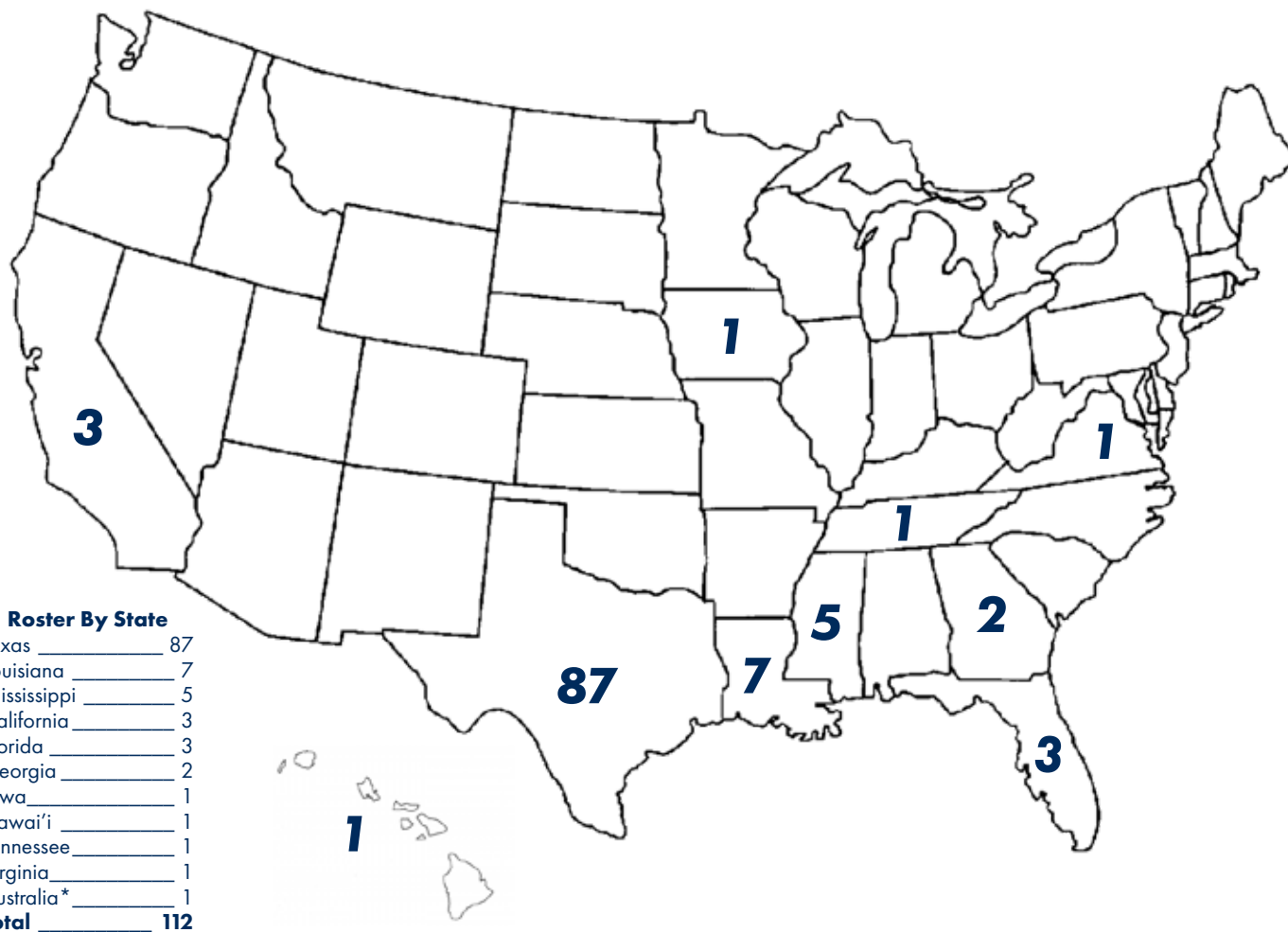

Conference USA is building the next generation of great college programs with innovative partnerships, dynamic leadership and diverse membership. We are STRONGER TOGETHER and determined to achieve our vision THE C-USA WAY. A league rich in history and tradition, C-USA prides itself on upholding unwavering standards of success and integrity throughout the ever-changing landscape of collegiate athletics. The commitment to excellence, leadership and its student-athletes in competition, academics and community remains at the forefront as the league embarks on its 27th season.

Conference USA enjoys a far-reaching fan base with its 14 members: Charlotte, FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Marshall, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Old Dominion, Rice, Southern Miss, UAB, UTEP, UTSA and WKU.

Debuted in 1995, Conference USA teams have combined for 121 bowl appearances in football, 112 NCAA Tournament appearances in basketball, including three Final Fours, 77 NCAA baseball appearances including six College World Series berths, 100 NCAA soccer tournament appearances including five trips to the College Cup, and 41 individual national champions in track and field and cross country. The league celebrated its first team national championship with Marshall winning the 2020 Men's Soccer College Cup with a thrilling overtime victory.

Success is not limited to athletic achievement as more than 265 Conference USA student-athletes have garnered Academic All-America honors, and more than 877 have achieved academic all-district laurels and thousands of student-athletes have earned a college degree.

Conference USA sponsors competition in 20 sports – nine for men (baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field) and 11 for women (basketball, beach volleyball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball).

The league promotes the scholar-athlete ideal, honoring outstanding academic achievement with numerous conference-sponsored awards, including the Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Commissioner's Academic Medal as well as sport-specific All-Academic teams.

C-USA annually awards 14 Jim Castañeda Postgraduate Scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Awards, Scholar-Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award. Additionally, Conference USA presents a Spirit of Service Award three times each year, recognizing student-athletes who excel on the field, in the classroom and give back to the community through significant service efforts and participation.

The conference's footprint is concentrated with 14 members in 10 states and a combined area population of more than 30 million. With a commitment to community involvement, the conference developed several initiatives to

maintain strong ties in C-USA cities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. C-USA schools also place a priority on giving back to their communities through volunteer service with local and national organizations. Individually, student-athletes are recognized each season through the Spirit of Service award.

In addition to the numerous NCAA Tournament berths, C-USA has sent three softball teams to the Women's College World Series and four volleyball teams to the NCAA Sweet 16. The league has also had 41 national champions in NCAA track and field competition, one national champion in diving, and numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in cross country, golf, swimming, tennis, and track and field. The Michael L. Slive Athlete of the Year Award, named after the league's first commissioner, recognizes the most outstanding male and female student-athlete each season.

SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

C-USA institutions are among the nation's best in academic performance of student-athletes, bolstered by the fact that student-athletes at league schools have a higher graduation rate than the general student population. Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In 27 years, more than 47,500 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom. Honor Roll is awarded to student-athletes in Conference sponsored sports that have achieved a 3.0 cumulative GPA or above, while Academic Medal recipients have achieved a 3.75 cumulative GPA or above.

C-USA MULTIMEDIA PARTNERS

C-USA enjoys significant exposure through various multimedia partners. Partnerships include CBS Sports Network, ESPN and Stadium. The multi-tiered selection process that is rooted in partnering with all entities has substantially increased the number of national, regional and digital appearances for football, men's and women's basketball and conference Olympic sports.

C-USA membership includes eight institutions in the Top 75 television markets, six in the Top 40 media markets and five in the Top 25 according to SNL Kagan. C-USA home markets include more than 13 million TV households with a total population of more than 30 million people.

CUSA.TV

Conference USA introduced CUSA TV in the fall of 2016. Powered by Sidearm Sports, CUSA TV includes live streaming of non-televised events, video on demand, specialty events, regular-season and championship event highlights, press conferences and feature stories. Available exclusively at CUSA.tv, it is one-stop online access to the league and each school has its own branded channel and URL.

C-USA IN THE COMMUNITY

Conference USA values the performances of its student-athletes on and off the playing field. The league also places an emphasis on cultivating relationships in C-USA member communities through volunteer service and has implemented several initiatives designed to maintain strong ties within our communities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. Individually, student-athletes are recognized each season through the Spirit of Service award.

GOVERNANCE

Conference USA has significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The presidents of the member institutions serve as the league's Board of Directors.

A PROUD HISTORY

Conference USA was formed in 1995 and quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences. The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner April 24, 1995, in Chicago. The league's charter members were Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, Houston, Louisville, Marquette, Memphis, Saint Louis, Southern Miss, Tulane, UAB and USF. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996.

The league's headquarters were established in Chicago and, after nine years, relocated to the current office in Dallas, Texas. Britton Banowsky was named Commissioner in October 2002, succeeding Mike Slive, the league's first Commissioner. In October 2015, Judy MacLeod became the league's third Commissioner.

C-USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB began football play in 1999. The league brought in TCU and ECU (1999) for all sports and they began competition in 2001. USF started C-USA football in 2003. Marshall, Rice, SMU, Tulsa, UCF and UTEP became full-time Conference USA members for all sports in 2005.

In 2013, charter member Charlotte returned to C-USA and was joined by new members FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Old Dominion and UTSA. WKU joined the league on July 1, 2014.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

Every Game Counts

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

Rankings

The selection committee ranks the teams based on the members' evaluation of the teams' performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents to decide among teams that are comparable.

Tradition

The New Year's holiday period belongs to college football, with two semifinal games rotating annually among the Cotton Bowl, Fiesta Bowl, Orange Bowl, Peach Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl.

Championship Monday

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

Universal Access

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance during the regular season. No team automatically qualifies.

Governance

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

Selection Committee

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee.

C-USA and the College Football Playoff

As a member of the College Football Playoff, Conference USA will be a part of one of the College Football Playoff bowls if it has the highest-rated champion from among the American Athletic, C-USA, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt.

UTSA MEDIA POLICY

Media Coverage

The UTSA Athletics Communications Office assists members of the media with their coverage of all 17 Roadrunners sports by coordinating interviews and providing feature ideas, notes, statistics and any other information needed. Media members may check the athletics department’s website — goUTSA.com — for the latest information on all UTSA sports.

Football Season Credentials

Season credentials and parking requests for UTSA home games must be requested by emailing Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu). Only media covering the Roadrunners on a consistent basis and on assignment will be considered. A lost season credential will result in passes being issued on a game-by-game basis, if available.

Football Single-Game Credentials

Credential and parking requests for individual home games should be emailed to Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) by 5 p.m. on Wednesday of the respective week, but early requests are encouraged and appreciated. Credentials only will be granted to media on assignment. For UTSA road games, please contact Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) by 5 p.m. on Monday of the preceding week for the game you wish to cover and include any parking needs you may have.

Non-Football Credentials

Media wishing to apply for credentials to cover other UTSA home events should send a request to the Athletics Communications Office for the sport they wish to cover at least 24 hours prior to the event. These credentials WILL NOT allow access to cover UTSA home football games.

Credential Will Call

Credentials can be mailed upon request or picked up in person with proper identification at the Athletics Communications Office located on the UTSA Main Campus. For home football games, media that has not yet received credentials may pick those up beginning three hours prior to kickoff at the Alamodome Media Entrance located at the East 50-yard line glass doors.

Football Game Day Parking

Media with a UTSA Football Game Day Parking Pass may park in Lot A (south of Alamodome/northeast corner of IH-37 & Cesar Chavez Boulevard interchange). Requests must be made to Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) at least one week in advance. Passes are issued on a single-game basis only and there are limited quantities per game. There are no season parking passes for UTSA football games.

Non-Game Day Media Parking

Media needing to drive onto UTSA’s Main Campus for interviews may request a visitor parking permit by contacting the UTSA

Athletics Communications Office for the sport they are covering at least 24 hours in advance of arrival.

Alamodome Access

All media members must enter the Alamodome through the media entrance located on the East 50-yard line glass doors. The entrance and all press work areas will open three hours prior to kickoff. No media members will be allowed to enter the Alamodome through the South Loading Dock. A UTSA-issued credential or game ticket is required for entrance to all home football games.

Press Box Services

The Alamodome press box is located on the Mezzanine Level (Level 3) of the east side of the facility. A UTSA-issued credential is required for entrance to the press box. Game notes, flip cards, game programs, official stats, notes and quotes will be provided online. A limited amount of hard copies of flip cards and final stats will be available to the media. Wireless internet access is complimentary for working media members. Media members who wish to order a dedicated internet connection or phone line must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at jason.bippert@sanantonio.gov. Seats will be assigned according to UTSA’s credential criteria.

Live Statistics

UTSA will provide live statistics online at goUTSA.com for all home events and real-time statistics to credentialed media through a private URL that will be provided on football game days.

Photographers/Videographers

Photographers and videographers on assignment are welcome to shoot all UTSA home events with proper credentials requested through the Athletics Communications Office. For sideline access at home football games at the Alamodome, photographers and videographers will be required to check in for a photo vest. A work room is located in Meeting Room A near the northeast tunnel to the field and it is equipped with complimentary hard-wired and wireless internet access, flip cards and refreshments. Photographers who wish to order a dedicated internet connection must contact Jason Bippert of the Alamodome at jason.bippert@sanantonio.gov. Photographers and videographers will not have a reserved seat in the Alamodome press box. Upper photo and video area requests should be made in the press box at least two hours prior to kickoff.

Postgame Interview Rooms

Postgame interview rooms for all home football games are located on Field Level (Level 1) on the east side of the Alamodome. UTSA will hold a postgame press conference for head coach Jeff Traylor and requested student-athletes after a 10-minute cooling off period. The UTSA locker room is closed and there will be no interviews conducted on the field except for the television network that is broadcasting the game. All requests for the visiting team should be made with that team's SID.



Interview Policy

All interviews with UTSA student-athletes and coaches must be arranged at least 24 hours in advance by contacting the Athletics Communications Office. Telephone interviews are available to the media on a "call-back" basis ONLY and at a time that is convenient for the interviewee. Contact information (i.e., cell phone numbers) for student-athletes and coaches will not be provided to the media.

Football Media Availability

During the season, UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor will be available on Monday mornings at a weekly media roundtable. Traylor and student-athletes will be available following practice on Tuesdays

and Wednesdays. All requests should be made by 5 p.m. Sunday of game weeks to Associate Athletics Director for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu).

Practice Policies

UTSA football practices will be held on Main Campus (unless otherwise noted). Practices are closed, but portions of some practices may be open to members of accredited media outlets with a UTSA-issued credential. Media planning to shoot this portion of practice should contact Associate AD for Communications Kyle Stephens (kyle.stephens@utsa.edu) to confirm arrangements and practice times. Questions pertaining to practice schedules and specific media information regarding coverage for all other sports may be directed to the UTSA Athletics Communications Office.

Introduced as UTSA head coach on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate and positive impact on the program in a short period of time.

The third head coach in school history, Traylor guided the Roadrunners to a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl in his first season at the helm. The seven wins are the most by a first-year UTSA head coach, while the Roadrunners notched the best overall and conference win totals since the 2013 team went 7-5 and 6-2. UTSA received votes in a national poll, collecting two votes for the Associated Press Top 25 following the 3-0 start, for the first time in program history during Traylor's debut campaign.

The 2020 season also saw the Roadrunners recognized with an unprecedented number of individual awards on both the conference and national levels.

Lucas Dean, Hunter Duplessis and Sincere McCormick received All-America accolades, while McCormick also was a finalist for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award. Additionally, Duplessis (Campbell Trophy, Lou Groza Award) and McCormick (Doak Walker Award) were national award semifinalists, while Frank Harris made the Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2020. Dean was tabbed C-USA Special Teams Player of the Year and McCormick was named C-USA Offensive Player of the Year, while a total of 23 Roadrunners were recognized by the league's head coaches, including 19 as all-conference and four on the all-freshman team. The Roadrunners collected a program-record 11 C-USA Player of the Week certificates — seven more than any previous year — and a trio of national player of the week accolades in McCormick (Earl Campbell Tyler Rose National Player of the Week), Dean (Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week) and Rashad Wisdom (Jim Thorpe Award Player of the Week).

Traylor has 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games, a winning percentage that ranks 10th all-time in Texas high school history.

Prior to coming to the Alamo City, the Gilmer native served as associate head coach and running backs coach for two seasons at Arkansas, where he helped sign the school's first top-20 recruiting class. Prior to that, he served in the same role at SMU for the 2017 season. He began his collegiate coaching career as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas in 2015 before becoming the Longhorns' associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach the following year.

Traylor's impact on the offense was felt immediately in his first season at Arkansas, as his running backs corps racked up 1,721 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2018. The unit was led by Rakeem Boyd, who rushed for more than 100 yards in three different SEC games, including a season-best 113 against Vanderbilt. The Houston Stratford High School product took over the starting tailback role in the fifth game of the season and his most impressive stretch of the season came during a four-game stretch against Alabama, Ole Miss, Tulsa and Vanderbilt, as he topped the century mark three times and totaled 423 yards. His 102 yards against Alabama made him the first Arkansas running back to eclipse 100 yards against the Crimson Tide since Darren McFadden in 2007.

In Traylor's second season coaching the Arkansas running backs, Boyd rushed for 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns on 184 carries (6.2 avg.) to spearhead a ground game that accumulated 1,766 yards. Boyd topped 100 yards in five contests, including a season-best 185 and two scores on just eight attempts against Western Kentucky. He also rushed for 100-plus against Portland State (114), Colorado State (122), Kentucky (134) and Mississippi (114).

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Traylor spent the 2017 season as associate head coach and running backs coach at SMU under Chad Morris. He also served as the Mustangs' interim coach before joining Morris' staff at Arkansas.

During his one year at SMU, Traylor's running backs piled up 2,223 yards on the ground. Three players rushed for 500-plus yards, with Xavier Jones leading the group at 1,075. The Mustangs topped the 200-yard mark on the ground six times, including a season-best 311 in a win against Arkansas State. SMU ranked in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense and 15th in total offense.

Prior to his time in Dallas, Traylor spent two seasons at Texas. He was the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in 2015 and then the associate head for offense and wide receivers coach in 2016, when the Longhorns boasted the nation's No. 16-ranked offense that averaged 491.3 yards per game. During his time as the lead recruiter, he helped the Longhorns sign the No. 7-ranked recruiting class in the country in back-to-back years and was named Scout.com's Big 12 Recruiter of the Year. He recruited punter Michael Dickson, who went on

to earn multiple All-America honors, win Big 12 Conference Special Teams Player of the Year in 2016 and 2017 as well as the 2017 Ray Guy Award, and currently punts for the Seattle Seahawks.

Traylor built his hometown program into a prep powerhouse during his 15-year tenure leading the Buckeyes.

A four-time Texas High School Coach of the Year, he posted a 175-26 record (.871 winning percentage) and led Gilmer to five state championship game appearances, three state titles (2004, '09, '14) and 12 district crowns. The Buckeyes turned in a pair of perfect 16-0 seasons, won 10-or-more games 11 times and registered seven 13-win seasons and three 15-win campaigns during his career.

In 2014, his undefeated Class 4A Division II state championship team boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history. Gilmer scored 950 points, the second-most in state history, averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards over the 16-game season. The Buckeyes topped 60 points nine

times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest. The defense was equally dominant, allowing only 276 points (17.3) with five single-digit efforts and two shutouts, while recording 23 interceptions and forcing 17 fumbles. Gilmer closed out the season with a win over West Orange-Stark and had eight different players earn 4A All-State honors from either the Associated Press or Texas Sports Writers Association.

Gilmer's two other state titles under Traylor both came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into 4A. After 15 years on its sidelines, Gilmer renamed Buckeye Stadium to Jeff Traylor Stadium to honor his successful career.

Inducted into the East Texas Coaches Association Hall of Honor in 2019, Traylor has received numerous coaching honors, including being named Coach of the Decade (2000s) by the Tyler Morning Telegraph. He is a 12-time District Coach of the Year, four-time East Texas Coach of the Year and a four-time Ted Jeffries Award winner. He has received the Carl Padilla Coach of the Year, KYKX Coach of the Year and Old Coach Network Coach of the Year awards twice each.

Traylor began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Big Sandy High School in 1990-93 before a seven-year stint (1994-2000) at Jacksonville High School where he served as passing coordinator, defensive backs coach, receivers coach and special teams coordinator. There, he helped coach future NFL quarterbacks Josh McCown and Luke McCown and former Texas A&M standout signal-caller Randy McCown.

A 1986 graduate of Gilmer High School, Traylor earned both undergraduate (1990) and graduate (2002) degrees in education from Stephen F. Austin while playing football as a walk-on.

He and his wife, Cari, have three children: Jordan, Jacob and Jaci.

Barry Lunney Jr., who most recently served as the interim head coach at Arkansas, was named associate head coach and offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at UTSA on Dec. 13, 2019.

In his first season overseeing the offense, Lunney guided the Roadrunners to new heights with a balanced attack, helping the team to a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in the Conference USA West Division at 6-2 and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. UTSA broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24) behind All-American running back and 2020 Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year Sincere McCormick. The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and Doak Walker Award semifinalist shattered UTSA's single-season marks for yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) while finishing second in the FBS with a program-record 133.4 rushing yards per game. The Roadrunners also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Despite having to use four different quarterbacks during the 2020 campaign due to injuries and COVID-19 protocols, Lunney's passing game piled up 2,399 yards and 16 touchdowns on 60-percent passing (222-370). Davey O'Brien QB Class of 2020 honoree and honorable mention all-conference quarterback Frank Harris drew the most starts and completed 63.6 percent of his passes for 1,630 yards and 12 TDs while also rushing for 528 yards and nine scores. Wide receivers Joshua Cephus and Zakhari Franklin emerged as a potent tandem for the air attack, as the two sophomores set UTSA season records for receptions (58) and receiving yards (694), respectively.

In addition to McCormick and Harris, the offensive line trio of Spencer Burford, Makai Hart and Ahofitu Maka were tabbed second-team all-conference, while Cephus, Franklin and tight end Leroy Watson all received honorable mention recognition. Burford also was named to the Dave Campbell's Texas Football All-Texas College First Team, Maka was a Rimington Trophy watch list member and offensive lineman Demetris Allen was picked for the C-USA All-Freshman Team.

Lunney came to San Antonio after spending six seasons as the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator at his alma mater in Fayetteville. He took over as the interim head coach late in the 2019 season and led the Razorbacks in games against No. 1 LSU and Missouri.

Lunney brings a wealth of experience to the Roadrunners, including three seasons at Tulsa (2000-02), two at San Jose State (2003-04), nine as the offensive coordinator at Bentonville (Ark.) High School and eight combined years at Arkansas (1998-99, 2014-19).

Lunney helped develop the Arkansas offensive attack into one that was spurred through its tight ends. During the 2018 season, the Razorbacks made a living off production out of the tight end position, completing 58.8 percent of the group's targets, which was above the team average. Arkansas finished the year ranked second in the country in tight end touchdowns and tied for fourth in the nation in tight end first downs, as Cheyenne O'Grady led the team in receptions (30) and touchdowns (six). In 2019, O'Grady led the Razorbacks with 33 catches and four TDs in 12 games.

From 2014 to 2016, Lunney developed one of the top tight ends in Arkansas history in Hunter Henry, who won the John Mackey Award and was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior in 2015. He was the first tight end taken in the 2016 NFL Draft with the 35th overall pick by the Chargers, and he has become one of the top receiving threats in professional football.

Henry led all FBS tight ends with 739 receiving yards on 51 receptions – each career highs – and hauled in three touchdown passes in 2015. In addition, Henry and tight end mate Jeremy Sprinkle combined for a league-best 1,128 receiving yards and eight touchdowns.

During his career, Henry hauled in 116 passes for 1,661 yards and nine touchdowns. He is one of only eight tight ends in SEC history to reach the triple-digit mark in receptions while playing in the conference. Of the eight, he is one of four to tally more than 1,500 receiving yards. In addition, his 1,661 career receiving yards rank second in program history among tight ends, only trailing Williams (1,855, 2007-10). His 116 receptions and 1,661 receiving yards through those three seasons were both tops in the SEC among tight ends.

A year later, Sprinkle followed Henry's footsteps and was taken by the Washington Redskins in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft. During his senior season, Sprinkle set the Arkansas record for career TDs by a tight end with 11 and was also invited to play in the Reese's Senior Bowl.

Lunney also oversaw the transition of AJ Derby from quarterback to tight end. Derby finished fifth in the SEC with 303 receiving yards during the 2014 season and was a sixth-round draft choice of the New England Patriots despite playing the position for less than a year.

In his first season coaching the Arkansas tight ends, Lunney led Henry to second-team All-SEC, Freshman All-America and SEC All-Freshman Team recognition. Henry's receiving yards ranked third in the nation among freshman tight

ends, and he was the only freshman tight end in the SEC with a 100-yard receiving game. Henry also led SEC tight ends and ranked third in the conference by gaining a first down on 78.6 percent of his receptions.

Before returning to the Razorbacks, Lunney served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Bentonville High School from 2005-13.

In his eight years at Bentonville, the Tigers won 78 games, including 25 straight in 2010-11, played in four state championship games, claiming state titles in 2008 and 2010, and won six straight 7A West Conference crowns from 2007-12. Bentonville played in three 7A state championship games and won at least 12 games in four of his last five seasons.

Bentonville quarterback Dallas Hardison broke the Arkansas state single-season completion percentage record in 2010 and bettered the record in 2011 under the direct guidance of Lunney. In 2011 and 2012, the Tigers won their first 12 games to advance to the state championship game with an offense that averaged 42.5 and 36.8 points per game, respectively.

The 2010 Bentonville team finished the season 13-0 and won the 7A state championship. The offense averaged 47.0 points per game and scored at least 40 points nine times, including 49 points in the semifinal round and the state championship game.

Lunney's first state title at Bentonville came in 2008 as the Tigers won 12 games for the first time since 2001. The offense averaged 30.2 points per game and scored more than 30 points in seven of 13 games.

Before moving to the high school coaching ranks, Lunney compiled seven years of collegiate coaching experience.

Lunney spent two seasons as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at San Jose State. During his tenure, the offense produced six all-conference performers, and tight end Courtney Anderson was selected by the Oakland Raiders in the 2004 NFL Draft. In 2003, the Spartans ranked 17th in the NCAA in passing offense and quarterback Scott Rislov ranked third in the WAC in passing efficiency and total offense.

Prior to that, Lunney spent three seasons at Tulsa, first working with quarterbacks in 2000 and 2001 and then moving to wide receivers in 2002. In 2000, quarterback Josh Blankenship ranked fifth in the WAC in total offense and receiver Don Shoals led the conference and ranked 11th in the NCAA in receptions per game.

His coaching career began with two seasons as a graduate assistant at Arkansas following a standout career for the Razorbacks. In 1998, Arkansas won its first eight games and rose to No. 9 in the national rankings on the way to sharing the SEC Western Division title and earning a berth in the Citrus Bowl. Lunney served as the Razorbacks' running backs coach for the bowl game and throughout the spring of 1999. Arkansas spent the majority of the 1999 season in the top 25 of the national rankings and finished the year with a 27-6 win over No. 14 Texas in the Cotton Bowl.

As a player for the Razorbacks, Lunney lettered from 1992-95, starting 40 games at quarterback, and was a team captain on the 1995 team that played in the SEC Championship Game for the first time in school history. In his first game as the starting quarterback, he led Arkansas to an upset win at No. 4 Tennessee. He left Arkansas holding school career records for passing yards, passing touchdowns, pass completions, pass attempts and total offensive plays. Lunney also played baseball at Arkansas. He was drafted by the Montreal Expos out of high school in 1992 and by the Minnesota Twins in 1996 and played one season of minor league baseball in the Twins organization.

Lunney graduated from Arkansas in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology. He and his wife, Janelle, have two sons, Luke and Levi. His grandfather, John lettered at Arkansas from 1946-49. His father, Barry Sr., retired after 28 years as a high school football coach in Arkansas, winning eight state championships at Bentonville HS and Fort Smith Southside HS.

Jess Loepp is in his second year as a member of UTSA's defensive coaching staff. He was promoted to co-defensive coordinator in January 2021 after serving as recruiting coordinator and safeties coach in his first season with the Roadrunners.

Loepp played a key role on the staff in 2020, including helping to coordinate the defense during the last two months of the campaign. The Roadrunners finished with a 7-5 record, a second-place finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. UTSA led C-USA in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Loepp, who will continue to coach the program's safeties, helped mentor Rashad Wisdom to first-team all-conference honors in 2020. Under his tutelage, Wisdom led UTSA in total tackles with 95, solo tackles with 60 and interceptions with four, which tied the school's single-season standard, paced C-USA and ranked eighth among all FBS players. Additionally, safeties Kelechi Nwachuku and Antonio Parks also blossomed during their first year under Loepp. Parks registered 50 tackles, including 32 solo stops, two pass breakups, a pair of quarterback hurries, one interception, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery, while Nwachuku posted 56 total tackles, 35 solo stops and three PBUs.

Loepp joined the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season as the senior offensive analyst at Arkansas. He also has served on staffs at Rice, SMU and Tulsa and on the high school level during a coaching career that has seen him mentor 15 all-conference performers, two bowl game MVPs, one Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist and four players who went on to the NFL.

Prior to his time at Arkansas, Loepp coached safeties during the 2018 season at Prosper High School after a three-year stint as the secondary coach at SMU in 2015-17.

In 2016, SMU's defense was statistically one of the 10 most-improved in college football. The Mustangs ranked seventh nationally in interceptions per game, and Loepp's secondary was responsible for 16 of the 18 picks. Following the season, defensive backs Darrion Millines and Horace Richardson, who each ranked in the top 15 for interceptions in 2016, were named first-team All-Conference.

Loepp spent eight total years at Tulsa — six as a full-time assistant coach (2007, 2010-2014), three as a graduate assistant coach (2003-05) and one as director of high school relations (2009).

During his tenure with the Golden Hurricane, Loepp was part of six bowl games - 2003 Humanitarian Bowl, 2005 and 2012 AutoZone Liberty Bowls, 2008 GMAC Bowl, 2010 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl and the 2011 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. He has also been a part of Tulsa's two Conference USA Championship seasons in 2005 and 2012.

Under Loepp's tutelage, Dexter McCoil became the school's career-leader for interceptions in 2012 and along with fellow safety Demarco Nelson earned all-conference accolades. In 2011, the Tulsa defense ranked 12th nationally for interceptions and 25th for turnovers gained. In 2010,

Tulsa ranked first in NCAA statistics for interceptions with 24 pickoffs, second in turnover margin and third in turnovers gained.

In 2009, Loepp returned to Tulsa and served as the school's director of high school relations.

Before returning to Tulsa, Loepp was an assistant football coach and strength coordinator at Lake Travis High School during the 2008 campaign. He helped lead that team to the Class 4A Division I State Championship, a 16-0 record and a top-10 ranking in most national prep polls, with the highest being second nationally.

In 2007, Loepp was in his second stint with the Hurricane, while coaching safeties and serving as Tulsa's recruiting coordinator. He helped Tulsa post a 10-4 record, reach the Conference USA Championship game and win the GMAC Bowl.

Loepp spent the 2006 season as an assistant coach at Rice, where he coached the Owls safeties and served as recruiting coordinator. At Rice, he helped coach a team that made a bowl game appearance for the first time in 45 years.

Rod Wright is in his third season as a member of UTSA's defensive coaching staff. He was promoted to co-defensive coordinator in January 2021 after serving as run game coordinator and defensive line coach in 2020. Prior to that, he coached the Roadrunners' d-line during the 2019 campaign.

Wright, who will continue to oversee the defensive line in 2021, played a key role on the defensive staff in 2020, including helping to coordinate the defense during the last two months of the campaign. The Roadrunners finished with a 7-5 record, a second-place finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. UTSA led C-USA in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Three of his defensive linemen — Lorenzo Dantzler, Jaylon Haynes and Brandon Matterson — earned honorable mention all-conference recognition, while Christian Clayton was named to the 2020 C-USA All-Freshman Team.

In his first year with the Roadrunners, Wright's defensive line helped UTSA break three of the program's single-season records and one single-game mark. The defense shattered the previous standard for tackles for loss in a season with 96 and also set new marks for sacks (2.2) and tackles for loss (8.0) per game. UTSA led Conference USA and ranked sixth nationally in tackles for loss per game. The Roadrunners also eclipsed the program's single-game TFL standard with 12 in the season finale against Louisiana Tech. Three of his defensive linemen — defensive ends Eric Banks and Jarrod Carter-McLin, as well as Haynes — were named honorable mention All-Conference USA.

Wright, a former All-America defensive lineman at Texas, came to San Antonio from East Carolina, where he was the Pirates' defensive line coach for the 2018 season. The defense broke the American Athletic Conference (AAC) single-game record for tackles for loss with 15 against Old Dominion and eclipsed the school and league single-season marks with 105 TFL that season.

Under his tutelage at ECU, defensive end Nate Harvey was named AAC Defensive Player of the Year and first-team all-conference after posting 63 tackles, 25.5 tackles for loss, 14.5 sacks, four quarterback hurries, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Harvey broke the school and AAC single-season TFL record and also matched set the conference single-season sacks standard in 2018.

Prior to his time at East Carolina, Wright spent four years at Sam Houston State. During his tenure, the Bearkats posted a 46-12 overall record, a 31-4 Southland Conference mark, reached the semifinals of the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs three times and the quarterfinals in another year. He also helped Sam Houston State to a pair of conference titles and top-five national ranking all four seasons.

Under Wright's tutelage, Sam Houston State defensive lineman P.J. Hall earned a spot on more than 10 All-America teams, including the Associated Press squad. He was a three-time finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, which is symbolic of FCS Defensive Player-of-the-Year honors. He ranked among the nation's top 10 with 19.0 tackles for loss as a senior and finished his career with a school- and FCS-record 84.0 TFLs before being selected by the Oakland Raiders in the second round of the 2018 NFL Draft.

Wright was invited to participate in the prestigious NFL Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship during the summers of 2016 and '17, observing and learning in camp with the Seattle Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers, respectively.

Prior to joining the Sam Houston State staff in February 2014, Wright worked a combined three seasons as a student assistant and defensive special assistant for Texas beginning in 2011.

A standout defensive lineman for Texas from 2002 to 2005, Wright collected All-America and All-Big 12 honors for Mack Brown and played a key role to help UT capture the 2005 BCS National Championship at the Rose Bowl. In all, he enjoyed seven bowl appearances as either a player or coach while with the Longhorns

He was named 2002 Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year and was a first-team selection for both the Football Writers Association of America and Sporting News Freshman All-America units.

Wright was a two-time winner of the Longhorns' Outstanding Defensive Lineman Award in 2003 and '04 and he earned all-conference honors in each of his final three seasons. He was a Lombardi Award finalist and an AP and Walter Camp First-Team All-American in 2005.

Drafted by the Miami, Wright played four years in the NFL for the Dolphins. He later suited up for the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League and the Dallas Vigilantes of the Arena Football League. As a prep athlete at Alief Hastings High School in Houston, he was a Parade All-American and an all-state performer.

Wright earned a bachelor's degree in education from Texas in 2011.

Wright and his wife, Kara, were married in 2019. He has three sons, Elijah and twins Kendrique and Kamden.

Tommy Perry was named UTSA's special teams coordinator in January 2020.

Perry had an immediate impact on the Roadrunners' special teams in his first season with the program, which resulted in a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. UTSA boasted arguably one of the top tandems of specialists in punter Lucas Dean and kicker Hunter Duplessis.

Under Perry's tutelage, Dean earned second-team All-America accolades from the Sporting News and was a fourth-team selection by Phil Steele after shattering UTSA's single-season punting average record with a 46.0 mark, which led Conference USA and ranked sixth nationally. The 2020 C-USA Special Teams Player of the Year and a first-team all-league pick, Dean punted 57 times with 27 that pinned opponents inside their own 20-yard line, 21 that sailed 50-plus yards, 10 that resulted in fair catches and only four that went for a touchback.

Duplessis, an honorable mention All-American by Phil Steele, emerged as one of the most reliable kickers in the country in 2020, making 17 of 20 field goals (85%) and converting 40 of 41 extra-point attempts en route to scoring a program-record 91 points. The Lou Groza Award semifinalist and first-team all-conference performer carried a streak of 23 consecutive field goals made from 2019 into October before it was snapped, and the Campbell Trophy semifinalist and C-USA All-Academic Team honoree also kicked off 46 times with 15 touchbacks in 2020.

A native of Monroe, La., Perry came to San Antonio from Nevada, where he was the Wolf Pack's special teams coordinator for three seasons under Jay Norvell.

In his first season at the helm of Nevada's special teams, the Wolf Pack ranked fourth in the Mountain West Conference in both kickoff return (22.1) and punt return (10.0) average. Daiyan Henley's 23.1 yards-per-return average on kickoffs ranked inside the top 50 nationally and was sixth in the league. Additionally, place-kicker Spencer Pettit hit a career-long 47-yard field in Perry's first year.

In Perry's second year, Nevada improved its punt return game from 10.0 yards per return to 12.59 yards per return, which ranked second in the Mountain West and 24th nationally. A big reason for the increase in punt return success was rookie Romeo Doubs, who returned a punt against Portland State 80 yards for a touchdown on his first collegiate touch. Perry also worked with punter Quinton Conaway, who averaged 43.6 yards per punt, which ranked in the top five in the league and in the top 30 nationally. Conaway also booted a 74-yard punt in 2018, which was tied for the 12th longest punt of the season across the nation.

In 2019, he helped the Wolf Pack to seven wins, including an upset of Purdue, and their second straight bowl game. Nevada punter Quinton Conaway posted an average of 43.0 yards per punt with a long of 67 and he pinned opponents inside the 20-yard line 16 times. Place-kicker Brandon Talton booted 21 of 25 field goals with a long of 56 and he ranked 18th nationally in field goals per game and 26th in field-goal percentage (.840). Kickoff specialist Julian Diaz registered 34 touchbacks on 56 kickoffs.

Perry is no stranger to Conference USA, as he spent four seasons as the running backs coach and special teams coordinator at North Texas. He did a complete transformation of the Mean Green special teams unit when he arrived in 2013 and the results were evident.

In 2014, North Texas converted 15-of-17 field goal attempts for a school-record 88.2 percent. Perry's kickoff return defense was fifth in the nation in 2014, holding its opponents to only 16.4 yards per return. Additionally, the Mean Green finished that season with the second-highest punting average (44.8) in the conference.

In Perry's first season with North Texas, the team led the nation with eight blocked kicks, including five blocked punts, which also paced all of FBS. Of those five blocked punts, three resulted in touchdowns. Perry's impact on special teams was also felt on the return game as the top returner averaged 27.6 yards per kick return, which included a 99-yard touchdown return against No. 9 Georgia.

The North Texas running backs also thrived under Perry in 2013. Former Mean Green back Brandin Byrd posted his first 1,000-yard rushing season and two of the top-10 longest rushes in school history. North Texas rushed for 31 touchdowns that year, at the time the second-most in school history and the most since 1951.

Prior to his tenure in Denton, Perry spent four seasons as an assistant at South Alabama, where he coached the running backs and special teams. In 2012, the first season at the FBS level for South Alabama, Perry coached place-kicker Michel Chapuseaux, who broke the school's single-season scoring record with 84 points. In the offensive backfield, the duo of Kendall Houston and Demetre Baker both finished in the top 10 among FBS Independents in rushing and scoring.

Prior to his time at South Alabama, Perry spent three seasons with the Alabama Crimson Tide working as both a graduate assistant and intern under Nick Saban and Mike Shula. The Crimson Tide went undefeated in the regular season in the fall of 2008, advancing to the Southeastern Conference Championship Game, as well as the Allstate Sugar Bowl. After posting a 12-2 record, the team finished the year ranked sixth in both the final Associated Press and USA TODAY top-25 polls.

Perry began his coaching career as an assistant strength & conditioning coach at Texas in 2004, also serving as an academic advisor for the Longhorns. He became the linebackers and a strength & conditioning coach at Texas A&M-Commerce later that year, moving over to coach running backs and handle kickoff return duties in 2005 for the Lions. Perry has additional experience coaching at the professional level after working as a special teams assistant and head strength coach for NFL Europe's Amsterdam Admirals in 2006.

The grandson of Texas A&M's 1957 Heisman Trophy winner John David Crow, Perry played two seasons for the Aggies as a fullback, inside linebacker and defensive end, while also participating on special teams.

Perry graduated from Texas A&M in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in English and history. He then earned his master's degree in health and human performance from Texas A&M-Commerce in 2005.

Matt Mattox was hired on Dec. 11, 2019, as UTSA's run game coordinator and offensive line coach.

In his first season with the Roadrunners, he helped the offense to a record-setting season that resulted in a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

With Mattox installed as run game coordinator, UTSA broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24). his offensive line helped pave the way for All-American running back and 2020 Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year Sincere McCormick. The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and Doak Walker Award semifinalist shattered UTSA's single-season marks for yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) while finishing second in the FBS with a program-record 133.4 rushing yards per game. The Roadrunners also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Three members of his offensive line group — Spencer Burford, Makai Hart and Ahofitu Maka — garnered second-team all-conference accolades, while Demetris Allen was a C-USA All-Freshman Team selection. Burford also was named to the Dave Campbell's Texas Football All-Texas College First Team and Maka was a Rimington Award watch list member for the nation's top center.

Mattox joined the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at McNeese.

A 17-year coaching veteran, Mattox also has spent time at Bowling Green, Eastern Illinois, South Florida, Texas and Tulsa.

In 2019, he oversaw a McNeese offense that posted an increase in every statistical category from the previous year, including the following: 382 total offensive yards per game, an increase of 92 yards from 2018; 165 yards rushing (+54 from 2018); 220 yards passing (+40); 26 points scored per game (+6); 24 passing TDs (+12); 12 rushing TDs (+8). In addition, the Cowboys ranked second in the Southland Conference in rushing in league games with a 170.7 average.

Mattox spent the 2017-18 seasons as the run game coordinator and offensive line coach at USF.

In 2018, he helped lead a running game that averaged more than 208 yards per contest to rank in the top 30 nationally.

In his first season at USF, Mattox tutored an offensive line unit that saw guard Jeremi Hall earn first team all-conference honors and tackle Marcus Norman earn second-team honors. Senior running backs Darius Tice (986 yards and 11 TD) and D'Ernest Johnson (836 yards and 7 TD) both had career-best years and joined second team, all-conference quarterback Quinton Flowers (1,078 yards and 11 TD) in helping USF run for 3,169 yards and 30 touchdowns. The Bulls ranked eighth in the nation in rushing offense (264.1 ypg), sixth in total offense (513.0 ypg) and 10th in scoring offense (38.3 ppg). The Bulls ran for 200 yards or more in nine games, eclipsing 300 yards in five and ranked 29th nationally in sacks allowed (1.50 spg).

Prior to USF, Mattox spent the 2016 season at Texas. He also coached at Tulsa (2015), Bowling Green (2014) and Eastern Illinois (2013).

As the run game coordinator and offensive line coach at Texas, Mattox coached All-Americans Connor Williams (left tackle) and running back D'Onta Foreman, who helped the Longhorns average 491.3 yards per game (16th in FBS) and 239.3 rushing yards per game (17th). The offense set a school record in 2016, totaling seven games with more than 500 yards. Under Mattox's guidance, Foreman finished second nationally with 2,028 rushing yards in 11 games, just the ninth Power 5 Conference player in NCAA history to record 2,000 yards in a season without the help of a bowl game. Foreman was named the 2016 Doak Walker Award winner and the 2016 Big 12 Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

The Texas offensive line was a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award, presented annually to the top offensive line unit in college football. Williams, who was drafted in the second round by the Dallas Cowboys in 2018, earned first-team All-Big 12 honors and was honorable mention for conference Offensive Lineman of the Year, while Kent Perkins was a second team selection on the offensive line.

In 2015, Mattox worked as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach to help lead a Tulsa attack that ranked 11th nationally in passing (333 ypg), 13th in total offense (507 ypg) and 21st in scoring (37 ppg). The offense was led by American Athletic Conference first-team receiver Keyarris Garrett, who finished with 1,588 receiving yards, 122.2 yards per game. Josh Atkinson amassed 1,071 receiving yards, while quarterback Dane Evans passed for 4,332 yards and 25 touchdowns.

Prior to Tulsa, Mattox was the co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Bowling Green in 2014. The Falcons gained 432.9 yards per game to rank 41st nationally in total yards, while averaging 173.0 yards on the ground and 259.9 yards passing, all without starting quarterback Matt Johnson, who was injured and would

the next year become the 2015 Mid-American Conference Offensive Player of the Year. Offensive lineman Alex Huettel was tabbed second-team All-Mid-American Conference and was named to the 2015 preseason Lombardi Award watch list, while wide receiver Roger Lewis recorded 1,093 receiving yards and earned first-team All-MAC honors.

During the 2013 season, Mattox served as the offensive line coach at Eastern Illinois, which led the FCS in total offense (589.5 ypg) and scoring (48.2 ppg), while ranking second with 372.4 passing yards, and 20th with 217.1 rushing yards per game, leading to a 12-2 record and an Ohio Valley Conference Championship.

Behind third-team All-Americans Dominic Pagliara and Collin Seibert, the offensive line paved the way for the record-setting offense that included quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo, who was named the 2013 Walter Payton Award winner, the FCS equivalent of the Heisman Trophy. Consensus first-team All-American Erik Lora led the nation in receptions with 123, which tied for second in FCS history. In addition to Paliara and Seibert, offensive linemen Nick Borre was tabbed second-team All-OVC, and Jimmy Lowery was on the All-Newcomer Team.

Before Eastern Illinois, Mattox spent six years as an offensive line/tight ends coach in the junior college ranks.

He served as the offensive coordinator during the 2012 season at Coffeyville Community College in Kansas. In his one season at Coffeyville, the offense averaged 370.2 total yards, including 170.2 rushing, and 28.8 points per game. Five of Coffeyville's offensive players earned all-conference honors, including center D.J. Lynn and guard Hayden Chandler.

Prior to Coffeyville, Mattox was the offensive line/tight ends coach at Butler (Kan.) Community College. During five seasons with the school from 2007-11, he helped coach the program to four conference and NJCAA Region VI Championships. In his tenure, he coached 31 all-conference offensive linemen and six junior college All-Americans.

In 2010, Butler advanced to the national championship game and finished the season ranked second in the nation with an 11-1 record and a conference and region title. The offense averaged 38.0 points per game, including a 40.4 average in region games, while recording over 370 yards per game.

The 2011 season also saw Butler post an 11-1 record with conference and region championships, along with a bowl win and a No. 2 final national ranking. The offense averaged 48.6 points and 499.3 yards per game in region play heading into the bowl and finished averaging 46.3 points for the season with just under 480 yards of offense.

Mattox began his coaching career at Houston, first working with the football program as an assistant strength coach in 2005 and then as a graduate assistant in 2006, assisting with the offensive tackles. Houston posted a 10-4 record in 2006, won the Conference USA Championship and made an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

A native of Holton, Kan., Mattox was a second-team junior college All-American tight end at Butler Community College. He played his final two collegiate seasons (2002-03) at Houston, moving from tight end to offensive tackle prior to his senior season. As a senior, Mattox earned second-team All-Conference USA honors for offensive tackle as the Cougars posted a 7-6 record and played in the Hawaii Bowl.

Will Stein was named UTSA's passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach on Dec. 20, 2019.

In his first season in San Antonio, he helped the Roadrunners to a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. His wide receivers group combined for 170 receptions, 1,923 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns, while helping lead a balanced offensive attack that piled up 2,399 passing yards and a school-record 2,585 rushing yards

A pair of his wide receivers — Joshua Cephus and Zakhari Franklin — earned honorable mention all-conference recognition. Cephus tied the program's single-season receptions record with 58 while tallying 547 yards and five TDs. Despite missing the first two games, Franklin eclipsed the UTSA season standard for receiving yards with 694 on 49 catches, and he also led the squad with seven scores through the air, the second-best total in program annals.

Stein came to UTSA after spending the previous two seasons as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator at Lake Travis High School in Austin.

During his two years at Lake Travis, he helped lead the Cavaliers to a 26-4 combined record and back-to-back appearances in the state semifinal round of the Class 6A Division I playoffs. He also mentored a pair of high school All-Americans during his tenure.

In his first year as offensive coordinator, Lake Travis posted 3,937 yards and 54 touchdowns passing and 2,578 yards and 31 TDs rushing, averaging 434.3 yards and 41.1 points per game.

In 2019, Stein's offense racked up 3,877 yards and 40 touchdowns through the air and 2,776 yards and 43 TDs on the ground while averaging 443.5 yards and 42.6 points per game.

Prior to his time at Lake Travis, Stein worked alongside UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor on Charlie Strong's staff at Texas in 2015-16. He served as offensive quality control and worked with the wide receivers.

Stein then worked with Texas' quarterbacks for the 2017 campaign and helped the Longhorns win the Texas Bowl, their first bowl victory since 2012.

A former standout quarterback at Louisville, Stein got his coaching start in 2013 as a graduate assistant for Strong at his alma mater, where he helped coach the quarterbacks. When Strong headed to Texas, Stein stayed one more season with the Cardinals and became an offensive quality control coach, working with the wide receivers under head coach Bobby Petrino.

A former standout cornerback at Tulsa and at six-year pro, Nick Graham joined the UTSA football staff as cornerbacks coach on Dec. 11, 2019.

In his first season in San Antonio, Graham helped the Roadrunners to a 7-5 record, a second-place finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. He was a key member of a defensive staff that helped UTSA lead C-USA in sacks (25), tackles for loss (85), interceptions (11), takeaways (19) and turnover margin (+7). In fact, the Roadrunners ranked in the top 30 nationally in five categories — 19th in turnovers gained, 23rd in passes intercepted, 25th in fumbles recovered (8), 26th in turnover margin and 29th in tackles for loss per game (7.1).

Graham's presence was felt immediately by the cornerbacks in 2020. Corey Mayfield Jr. received honorable mention all-conference recognition after posting a team-best six pass breakups to go along with a pair of interceptions, one forced fumble, 37 tackles and three tackles for loss. Ken Robinson was named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team after tallying 28 stops, three PBUs and a forced fumble in nine games. Additionally, Tariq Woolen, a converted wide receiver, made seven starts and recorded 35 tackles, 3.5 TFL, four PBUs, one interception and a forced fumble in 11 contests.

Graham came to the Roadrunners after spending the 2019 season at McNeese as the safeties coach. His position group was led by second-team All-Southland Conference safety Cory McCoy, who posted three interceptions, 15 pass breakups and 2.5 tackles for loss.

Prior to his time at McNeese, Graham spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Central Oklahoma, where he mentored four all-conference selections, including 2018 All-American defensive back O'Shay Harris.

In his first year with the Roadrunners, Griffin's running backs helped the offense to a record-setting season that resulted in a 7-5 overall record, a runner-up finish in the Conference USA West Division with a 6-2 mark and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

UTSA broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24) behind Sincere McCormick, who shattered UTSA's single-season marks for yards (1,467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) while finishing second in the FBS with a program-record 133.4 rushing yards per game. The Roadrunners also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Griffin, who was named to Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40 list in June 2021, mentored McCormick to arguably the most decorated season for any Roadrunner in school history. A second-team All-American by both the Football Writers Association of America and Phil Steele and the Conference USA Offensive Player of the Year and Dave Campbell's Texas Football Texas College Player of the Year, he logged seven 100-yard games on the ground, including five with 150-plus yards. The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist and Doak Walker Award semifinalist also broke his own UTSA record for all-purpose yards in a season with 1,598. A four-time C-USA Offensive Player of the Week honoree in 2020, McCormick already owns the program's career rushing yardage record with 2,450 in only 23 contests.

Griffin joined the UTSA coaching staff after serving as the offensive quality control assistant for two seasons at Arkansas. While with the Razorbacks, Griffin helped the offensive attack to 340.1 yards per game, including 192.9 through the air and 147.2 rushing yards per game. Running back Rakeem Boyd rushed 184 times for 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns in 2019. Four Razorbacks had at least 28 catches, including Mike Woods, who had 33 grabs for 423 yards and four TDs.

In his first season at Arkansas, Griffin helped the Razorbacks to 1,721 rushing yards, with Boyd totaling 734 yards on 123 carries. LaMichael Pettway had 30 catches for 499 yards and four TDs.

Griffin was an offensive quality control assistant at SMU for the 2017 season, helping the Mustangs offense rank in the top 20 nationally in several offensive categories, including 12th in scoring offense (37.8 ppg) and 15th

(478.5 ypg) in total offense. SMU won seven games behind an offense that scored 37.9 points per contest. Running back Xavier Jones rushed 182 times for 1,075 yards and nine TDs in 2017, while quarterback Ben Hicks threw for 3,569 yards and 33 TDs. Wide receiver Trey Quinn led the team with 114 catches for 1,236 yards and 13 TDs, while Courtland Sutton, a second-round pick by the Denver Broncos in 2018, also eclipsed the 1,000-receiving mark with 1,085 yards and 12 TDs.

In 2016, Griffin was the wide receivers/special teams coordinator at Central Methodist (Mo.), where he helped mentor all-conference safety Logan Rowles.

Griffin was the offensive graduate assistant at ULM, his alma mater, in 2015. The Warhawks' offense featured honorable mention all-conference wide receiver Marcus Green, who caught 63 passes for 698 yards and seven touchdowns.

A coaching veteran for more than two decades, Brad Sherrod is in his first season as UTSA's linebackers coach.

Sherrod, who spent more than a decade on the coaching staff at his alma mater, Duke, comes to UTSA from Tennessee State, where he was the Tigers' safeties coach in 2020, a season that was postponed to this spring due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

His long coaching career also has landed him on staffs at Delaware, East Tennessee State, Elon, Massachusetts, Sam Houston State, Wake Forest and Western Carolina.

Prior to his tenure at Tennessee State, Sherrod spent three seasons as the outside linebackers coach at Wake Forest. There, he tutored Justin Strnad, a 2020 fifth-round draft pick of the Denver Broncos who led all Atlantic Coast Conference linebackers and finished third nationally with three interceptions in 2017.

In his first season with the program, he helped lead the Demon Deacons to a Belk Bowl victory over Texas A&M to cap an 8-5 season. The defense broke the school record for tackles for loss in a season and also recorded 17 tackles for loss against Florida State, the most by a Power 5 Conference team in a single game during the 2017 season.

Sherrod also helped guide Wake Forest seven wins and a Birmingham Bowl victory over Memphis in 2018. The following year, the Demon Deacons posted an 8-4 regular season record and made an appearance in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

Prior to Wake Forest, Sherrod spent three years at Sam Houston State, where he was on the same staff as Rod Wright. He was co-defensive coordinator for his first two seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2016. The Bearcats went 34-10, earned three FCS playoff berths, won a Southland Conference title, defeated nine top-25 opponents and posted a pair of top-four national finishes during his three-year tenure in Huntsville.

While at Sam Houston, he coached a pair of All-Americans and eight all-conference performers. He mentored P.J. Hall, a current NFL defensive lineman who was a Buck Buchanan finalist, first-team All-American and Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year in 2016. He also tutored Justin Johnson to first-team All-America and all-conference accolades.

In 2016, he helped Sam Houston post a 12-1 record and achieve a No. 1 ranking in the FCS final regular season poll. The Bearcats lost to eventual national champion James Madison in the quarterfinal round of the FCS playoffs.

Sherrod served as the defensive coordinator at Elon in 2013 after a three-year stint as the linebackers coach at Delaware where he coached current NFL veteran Paul Worriolo, a first team all-conference performer, the conference's defensive rookie of the year, Jeff Williams and all-conference linebacker Matt Marcocelle. In his first year with the Blue Hens in 2010, the program went 12-3 and advanced to the FCS title game. That year the Delaware defense led the FCS in scoring defense (12.1 points per game) and was fifth in total defense (280.7 yards per game).

Sherrod spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons at Western Carolina, where he coached running backs and linebackers.

He spent 11 seasons on the staff at his alma mater, Duke, where he tutored the linebackers for nine years from 1997 to 2005, tight ends in 2006 and running backs in his final two campaigns. During his playing career at Duke, Sherrod was a team captain who earned second team All-ACC and Academic All-ACC honors as a senior in 1993 when he led the Blue Devils and ranked fifth in the ACC with 113 total tackles. A native of Monroe, N.C., Sherrod had 279 career stops during his Duke career from 1990-93.

As a prepster, Sherrod was a two-time all-state and honorable mention All-America selection at Monroe (N.C.) High School.

Sherrod earned his bachelor's degree in history from Duke in 1993.

A veteran of the Texas high school coaching ranks for nearly two decades, Kurt Traylor was named UTSA's tight ends coach on Dec. 19, 2019.

In his first season with the Roadrunners, Traylor helped UTSA to a record-setting season on offense that resulted in a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in the Conference USA West Division at 6-2 and an appearance in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. The Roadrunners broke single-season school records for rushing yards (2,585), rushing yards per game (215.4), yards per rush (5.21) and rushing touchdowns (24) and also smashed single-game standards for total yards (624) and rushing yards (443) in a game in a regular season-finale rout of North Texas.

Traylor mentored the tight ends, led by honorable mention all-conference performer Leroy Watson, to a combined 23 catches for 289 yards while also helping pave the way for UTSA's potent ground attack led by All-American running back Sincere McCormick, who set single-season records for rushing yards (1.467), carries (249) and touchdowns (11) in 2020.

Prior to joining the Roadrunners, Traylor was the head coach at Tyler Lee High School for three seasons (2017-19), where he coached 2020 UTSA signee Jamal Ligon. The younger brother of UTSA head coach Jeff Traylor, he guided the Raiders to 14 wins during his tenure and led the program to its first playoff appearance in five seasons in 2019. His first season at Tyler Lee resulted in the program's first winning record since 2008 and a victory over rival Tyler John Tyler.

Traylor also started several different programs at Lee, including Adopt a Raider, Honorary Teachers Captains, BEAST Texas Passing Academy and the Coaches Outreach Program.

Prior to Tyler Lee, Traylor spent 17 years as an assistant coach at Gilmer High School. He helped lead the Buckeyes to three state titles, two additional state championship game appearances, 14 district titles and 16 playoff appearances.

Traylor was a key part of a staff that transformed Gilmer into a perennial prep powerhouse, serving as the offensive run game coordinator, offensive line coach and offseason coordinator. During his tenure, he coached numerous all-state players, including David Snow, a U.S. Army All-American who went on to star on the offensive line at Texas.

In his first year in Gilmer, the Buckeyes recorded their first winning season since 1996. In his second year, the Buckeyes won a district title and made their first playoff appearance since 1991. Gilmer repeated as district champions and made the playoffs again in year three.

In 2003, Gilmer posted a 13-1 record and recorded its first playoff win since 1991 while advancing to the regional final.

One year later, the Buckeyes turned in a perfect 16-0 record in winning the Class 3A State Championship. That squad was led by Class 3A Player of

the Year Manuel Johnson, who went on to play wide receiver at Oklahoma and was drafted in the seventh round by the Dallas Cowboys.

In 2014, Gilmer posted a perfect 16-0 record en route to the Class 4A Division II State Championship. The Buckeyes boasted one of the most prolific offenses in Texas prep history, scoring 950 points in 16 games, the second-most in state history, and averaging 59.4 points and 536.1 yards per game. The Buckeyes topped 60-plus points nine times, including two 80-point performances. Gilmer also averaged 536.1 total yards per game (8,577 yards) behind a balanced 293.9 passing yards and 242.1 rushing yards per contest.

Gilmer's two other state titles came in Class 3A in 2004 (Division II) and 2009 (Division I), before the change in class structure in Texas high school football moved the school into 4A. The Buckeyes also were state finalists in 2007, when they were the only school in the nation to boast two U.S. Army All-Americans, and 2012. Gilmer also advanced to the state semifinal round during his last two seasons (2015-16).

Traylor gained his first coaching experience on the collegiate level as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M in 2002-03.

Traylor began his coaching career as junior high football coach at West Rusk in 1995 before a four-year stint (1996-99) at Jacksonville High School as the offensive line coach.

Traylor played offensive line at Gilmer High School, Cisco Junior College and Southwest Baptist University.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and health from Texas A&M-Commerce in 1995.

He and his wife, Katie, have four children, Allie, Rylie, Will and Kole.

A former assistant coach for UTSA's first five seasons and offensive coordinator for four, Kevin Brown is in his second year as Director of Football Operations.

Brown, who was an assistant coach under Larry Coker from 2011 to 2015, came to UTSA after spending two years as an offensive coordinator on the prep level. He is responsible for assisting the coaching staff with day-to-day operations of the program, coordinating practice schedules and team travel, assisting with summer camps, collaborating with campus organizations and organizing community service projects, among other duties.

In Brown's first year as UTSA's Director of Football Operations, the Roadrunners posted a 7-5 overall record, registered a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and earned an spot in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, the program's second bowl appearance.

Brown returned to the Roadrunners after a stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Boerne High School during the 2019 season. He helped the Greyhounds to a 7-4 record and a Class 4A Division I playoff appearance in his only season. Under his tutelage, the offense passed for 2,447 yards and 25 touchdowns and rushed for 919 yards and 10 TDs.

Prior to his time in Boerne, Brown was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at TMI Episcopal in San Antonio in 2018.

Brown spent the 2017 season as the wide receivers coach at Lamar, an FCS member of the Southland Conference. His position group combined to catch 160 passes for 1,876 yards and seven touchdowns. He also was responsible for the Cardinals' kickoff return unit, which tallied 832 yards on 40 returns.

An integral part of the UTSA coaching staff during its startup era, Brown coached the Roadrunners' tight ends during the inaugural 2011 campaign before being promoted in 2012 to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, and he remained in that role through the 2015 season.

Brown's offense produced the program's first 1,000-yard rusher in 2015, as Jarveon Williams gained 1,086 yards and scored eight touchdowns on 173 carries. Additionally, tight end David Morgan II caught 45 passes for 566 yards and five TDs en route to becoming UTSA's first All-American when he garnered second-team accolades from USA TODAY and honorable mention from SI.com. Morgan, a second-team all-conference choice that year, was the program's first NFL Draft pick when the Vikings selected him in the sixth round the following spring. All totaled, the Roadrunners' balanced attack tallied 4,347 yards of offense — 2,026 on the ground and 2,321 through the air — that fall.

In 2014, Brown's offense compiled 3,570 total yards. His quarterbacks combined for 2,069 yards and seven touchdowns on 202-of-355 passing and an additional 275 rushing yards despite battling numerous injuries throughout the season. Offensive guard Scott Inskip, wide receiver Kam Jones and Morgan all garnered honorable mention All-Conference USA accolades.

In 2013, Brown helped lead UTSA to a 7-5 overall record, including finishing second in the West Division with a 6-2 mark in their first season in C-USA. He mentored an offense that averaged 417.8 yards (175.4 rush/242.4 pass) and 25.6 points per game, with his quarterbacks

combining for 2,909 yards and 13 touchdowns through the air and 371 yards and seven scores on the ground. Inskip collected second-team all-league honors, while Jones, offensive tackle Cody Harris, tight end Cole Hubble and quarterback Eric Soza all were named honorable mention all-conference.

Brown helped guide the Roadrunners to an 8-4 overall record and a 3-3 mark in its first and only season in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) in 2012. The campaign was highlighted by historic wins against South Alabama, the program's first road and FBS victory, and New Mexico State, its first conference win. The offense averaged 31.2 points and 390.2 yards (159.2 rush/231.0 pass) per game and scored 44 touchdowns. He tutored the quarterbacks to 2,772 yards and 23 TDs through the air against only six interceptions, as the group combined for a 141.46 efficiency rating. Inskip collected second-team All-WAC accolades, while Jones, Harris, Hubble and running back Evans Okotcha received honorable mention.

The Waco native helped the Roadrunners to a 4-6 record in 2011 as the tight ends coach. The offense averaged 26.6 points and 364.5 yards (144.8 rush/219.7 pass) per game and scored 31 touchdowns during the inaugural campaign. UTSA's tight ends accounted for 262 receiving yards and a pair of TDs, with Morgan tallying 214 and both scores on 13 catches as a true freshman.

Prior to his first tenure at UTSA, Brown served as the receivers coach at Texas State for four seasons, where he helped the Bobcats break numerous school records.

In 2009, wide receiver Da'Marcus Griggs recorded 80 receptions en route to earning second-team All-Southland Conference honors. All totaled, Brown's wide receivers unit combined to catch 203 passes for 2,657 yards and 21 touchdowns that season.

A year earlier, Cameron Luke was named a third-team All-American after posting 73 receptions for two more records of 1,268 yards and 17 touchdowns. Luke broke the original record that he set in 2007 with 60 catches for 1,035 yards and 12 TDs and was named first-team all-conference.

Brown's corps combined to catch 185 passes for 2,800 yards and 27 touchdowns in 2008, and a year earlier, his receivers hauled in 137 throws for 1,825 yards and 17 scores.

Prior to his time at Texas State, Brown was an offensive graduate assistant coach at TCU, his alma mater, for three seasons. Among his responsibilities at TCU were working with the Horned Frogs' offensive linemen, film breakdown of opposing defenses and charting the opposition's defense from the press box on game days.

During his playing career as a wide receiver at TCU from 1998-2002, Brown caught 39 passes for 567 yards, an average of 14.5 yards per reception. He hauled in 16 passes for 208 yards as a senior in 2002 and also had four touchdown receptions during his career.

Brown was a member of five bowl teams. The Horned Frogs defeated USC, 28-19, at the 1998 Sun Bowl and East Carolina, 28-14, in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl. Brown capped his career as a member of TCU's 2002 Conference USA championship team, which beat Colorado State, 17-3, in the AXA Liberty Bowl.

The Horned Frogs made three more bowl appearances while Brown served on the coaching staff. TCU downed Northern Illinois, 37-7, in the 2006 Poinsettia Bowl and edged Iowa State, 27-24, in the 2005 EV1.net Houston Bowl after falling to Boise State by a score of 34-31 in the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl.

Brown graduated from TCU in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in business management and earned master's degrees in education administration (2004) and liberal arts (2006) from TCU.

A former prep standout, Brown was a first-team all-state wide receiver at Waco Midway High School in 1997.

He is married to the former Erika Davis. The couple has one daughter, Naomi.

Former Texas high school coach Joe Price III was named UTSA's Director of Player Personnel in March 2020.

Among Price's many responsibilities with the Roadrunners are initial identification and evaluation of prospects, managing prospect video and database, oversight of the day-to-day recruiting operations, organization of recruiting events and material and assisting with roster management.

In Price's first year as UTSA's Director of Player Personnel, the Roadrunners posted a 7-5 overall record, registered a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division with a 5-2 mark and earned an spot in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, the program's second bowl appearance.

Price joined UTSA after spending the 2019 season as the Director of High School Relations for the Illinois football program. During his one year in Champaign, the Fighting Illini won six games and made their first bowl appearance since 2014 when they played California in the Redbox Bowl.

Prior to his time at Illinois, Price spent 10 years as a high school coach in the Galena Park Independent School District. In addition to his coaching duties, he also was responsible for a variety of football operations, including fundraising, summer camps, serving as a liaison to college coaches, developing a website and producing highlight videos for college-bound athletes.

Price was the passing game coordinator, wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at perennial prep powerhouse North Shore High School from 2014 to 2018. He helped the Mustangs to a pair of Class 6A-DI state championships and four district titles during his time with the program. During his time on the staff, North Shore saw more than 75 players advance to the collegiate level.

In 2018, North Shore was named national champion by MaxPreps after posting a perfect 16-0 record and outscoring opponents 854-199, winning by an average margin of 41 points per game. North Shore capped its title run by beating Duncanville, 41-36, on a Hail Mary pass as time expired at AT&T Stadium.

Price got his coaching start in 2009 as an assistant coach, video coordinator, player development coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Galena Park High School.

A native of Houston and former standout at Aldine Nimitz High School, Price played football at Harding University in Searcy, Ark., where he was one of the top wide receivers in school history. A team captain as a senior in 2005, he ended his career ranked third in career receptions (121), eighth in career receiving yards (1,404), and ninth in receptions per game (2.88).

Price earned his bachelor's degree in business management from Harding in 2009 and a master's degree in education leadership/administration from Stephen F. Austin in 2017.

He is a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association, the American Football Coaches Association and the Greater Houston Area Football Coaches Association, where he served a secretary on the executive board of directors.

DR. LISA CAMPOS



UTSA Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics

Introduced as UTSA's Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics and Athletics Director on Nov. 17, 2017, Dr. Lisa Campos has made an immediate and positive impact on the athletics department, university and community during her time in San Antonio.

One of Campos' first tasks upon her hiring was to develop and implement a new strategic plan for the future of UTSA Athletics and align with UTSA President Taylor Eighmy's vision and strategic initiatives for the university. Less than one year later, she introduced the Roadrunner Game Plan, which utilizes three winning values — Excellence, Integrity and Unity — to focus on developing and enhancing the student-athlete experience, creating a culture of excellence, developing resources and uniting the community. The plan's emphasis to develop champions in the classroom, in competition and in life has been evident during her tenure.

In the last three years, UTSA student-athletes have set numerous department records for academic success including achieving an 83% graduation success rate in the most recent report and currently boasting an average team GPA of 3.27 as of the Spring 2021 semester. Additionally, student-athletes have collected 145 Conference USA academic medals and more than 600 C-USA Commissioner's Honor Roll certificates during her tenure.

Under her leadership, UTSA's sport programs have produced seven All-Americans, earned more than 130 all-conference honors and captured 17 individual conference titles and a pair of team conference championships in the last three years.

In her second year at the helm, Campos led a campus-wide collaboration with Brenda Tracy, a sexual assault survivor, public speaker and founder of the national campaign and nonprofit, Set The Expectation. Their work led to UTSA becoming the first university in the nation to implement the Tracy Rule, the most comprehensive Serious Misconduct rule in the NCAA.

Campos also has overseen the implementation of the Roadrunner Leadership and Professional Development Academy, which offers personal wellness, freshman transition and career development workshops to UTSA's 350-plus student-athletes. She also introduced UTSA Athletics Diversity & Inclusion Excellence, an initiative that seeks to foster a diverse and inclusive culture for the entire campus.

In June 2021, Campos helped UTSA become one of the first Conference USA institutions to introduce an educational and life skills program in anticipation of NCAA and state legislation related to name, image and likeness (NIL) activities. Runners Go Bold is a comprehensive program providing Roadrunner student-athletes with the knowledge and skills to build their personal brands and financial acumen.

Campos also worked closely with the Roadrunner Foundation and colleagues on campus to guide one of the most ambitious projects in the history of UTSA Athletics — the development of the new state-of-the-art Roadrunner Athletics Center of Excellence, which opened this month. The \$40.8 million, 94,700-square-foot facility serves as the central hub for UTSA Athletics and promotes the academic success, health, wellness and performance of student-athletes.

Campos has overseen the highest fundraising year in UTSA Athletics history, while also achieving the highest back-to-back fundraising years in department history. She also engineered a balanced 2020 fiscal year budget despite a major loss of revenue resulting from the pandemic.

Under Campos' leadership, UTSA Athletics has increased its brand presence and awareness in San Antonio and has extended its community outreach initiatives, including Operation Defend the Dome, a ticket donation program for area active-duty and veteran military members and their families. As a result, 42,071 fans — the second-largest home crowd in UTSA football history — packed the Alamodome against Baylor on Sept. 8, 2018. Additionally, UTSA led Conference USA in average home attendance during her first full football season in the Alamo City.

Campos also served as a panelist for the 2018 Greater San Antonio Women in Leadership Symposium, and she was instrumental in UTSA's role as host institution for the 2018 Men's Final Four and 2021 Women's Final Four and in the city landing the 2025 Men's Final Four.

Nationally, Campos currently sits on the NCAA Division I Council, a high-level group responsible for the day-to-day decisions that impact Division I athletics. She also serves as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and on the board of the LEAD1 Association, a membership organization that represents the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision athletics directors.

Campos also has served as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and NCAA Women's Soccer Committee, and has been a member of the NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee, NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and NCAA Rifle Committee.

Campos came to UTSA after five years as the Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at Northern Arizona University (NAU), where she led the athletics department through a rebrand and transformed it into one of the Big Sky Conference's premier programs.

During her time in Flagstaff, NAU captured 32 Big Sky and Western Athletic Conference championships and nine teams advanced to NCAA postseason competition, including the first NCAA Division I Championship in school history by the men's cross country team in 2016.

Under her leadership, the Lumberjacks collected two Big Sky Conference Presidents' Cup trophies for overall excellence in competition and in the classroom. The Lumberjacks' athletic achievements led to the men's programs winning the Big Sky All-Sports Trophy four consecutive times from 2014-17. The women's teams captured the trophy in 2014 and 2017.

In the 2016-17 academic year, NAU won eight conference championships and swept the Big Sky All-Sports Trophies for the second time under Campos' guidance.

When Campos was named Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at NAU, she became one of 26 females and the youngest in the country to lead a Division I program at the time of her hire. In Spring 2017, she was recognized by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's Forty Under 40.

Prior to her time at NAU, Campos was an associate athletics director (2003-06) and senior associate athletics director (2006-12) at UTEP after serving as the university's assistant dean of students from 2001-03.

During her time in El Paso, she cultivated several significant gifts to the program and oversaw a multimillion-dollar budget. Campos also served as sport administrator for the men's and women's cross country, women's soccer, women's volleyball, women's basketball and men's and women's track & field programs. Campos also was the primary administrator for compliance, CHAMPS/Life Skills, strength and conditioning, sports medicine and cheerleading.

Besides serving on a number of NCAA committees while at UTEP, Campos also was a member of the Conference USA Joint Group and served on the Senior Woman Administrator administrative group. In 2005-06, when UTEP joined Conference USA, she served on the C-USA Strategic Planning Committee and assisted in the development of the realigned Conference USA's vision, core values, mission and strategic objectives. She also represented UTEP on conference committees, including the budget subcommittee, legislative committee, championships selection committee and various sport committees.

Campos earned both her bachelor's degree in business administration and her master's degree in student affairs in higher education from Colorado State. She holds a doctorate degree in educational leadership from UTEP.

She and her husband, Darren D'Attilio, have a son, Christopher.

SAN ANTONIO — Frank Harris threw for 269 yards and ran for 104 more to help lead UTSA to a 24-10 victory over Stephen F. Austin on Saturday afternoon at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners ran their record to 2-0 under first-year head coach Jeff Traylor, who faced his alma mater in his home debut. UTSA, which opened up a 17-0 lead but could not put away the Lumberjacks (0-2) until late in the fourth quarter, now has won its first two games for the first time since 2017.

Harris completed 23 of 36 passes, including his second touchdown pass of the season, en route to a career-high passing yardage output. The junior quarterback also rushed for a pair of TDs and registered his second career 100-yard day on the ground, becoming the first UTSA QB in program history to top the century mark twice.

Sincere McCormick nearly notched his second straight 100-yard rushing game, as the sophomore from Converse Judson had 98 on 19 carries to go along with four receptions for 47 yards.

Meanwhile, Joshua Cephus had a career-best eight receptions for 89 yards and his second touchdown of his sophomore campaign and Sheldon Jones added four catches for 54 yards as the Roadrunners rang up 498 yards of total offense.

Rashad Wisdom paced the defense with nine tackles, while Trevor Harmanson recorded seven stops, including 1.5 behind the line of scrimmage. Jaylon Haynes posted six tackles, including three TFL and a pair of sacks, as UTSA tallied 10 total stops in the backfield.

SAN ANTONIO — Josh Adkins came off the bench to throw for 233 yards, Zakhari Franklin registered his second career 100-yard receiving game and Jamal Iigon broke UTSA's single-game tackles record as the Roadrunners outlasted Middle Tennessee, 37-35, in the Conference USA opener on Friday night at the Alamodome.

UTSA held on for the two-point win in the final minutes to run its record to 3-0 on the season, making Jeff Traylor the first head coach in program history to start his career with three wins. The Blue Raiders (0-3, 0-1) had a chance to tie it but failed on a two-point conversion attempt with 1:04 left to play, sending the Roadrunners to their fifth win in nine all-time league lid-lifers.

Iigon registered 19 tackles, including eight solo stops and 1.5 sacks, to go along with a pair of quarterback hurries in his record-setting night. The true freshman from Tyler eclipsed the previous standard of 16 set by Cody Rogers on Nov. 12, 2011, against McNeese State to lead the defense.

Meanwhile, Adkins completed 16 of 28 passes for 233 yards and a touchdown in a little more than one half of football. The junior transfer from Smithson Valley High School entered the game on the final drive of the second quarter after Frank Harris left the game with an injury.

Franklin hauled in six passes for 119 yards and a TD in his first action of the season. The sophomore from Cedar Hill logged his second career 100-yard receiving game and the 15th in program history to lead the receiving corps.

McCormick paced the UTSA offense with his second 100-yard rushing game of the season and fifth of his career came on the strength of 22 carries. Narcisse added 42 yards on the ground, while Jordan Weeks, who came into the game after starting quarterback Josh Adkins was injured on the first play from scrimmage, completed seven passes for 57 yards.

PROVO, Utah — Lowell Narcisse came off the bench to throw for 229 yards and two touchdowns, but Zach Wilson threw for 292 yards and a pair of scores to help No. 15 BYU hold off UTSA 27-20 on Saturday at LaVell Edwards Field.

Entering the Saturday afternoon nationally televised matchup as sizeable underdogs, the Roadrunners (3-2) battled the Cougars (4-0) to the wire thanks to a big-play passing attack and a bend-but-don't-break defense in their sixth all-time game against a ranked FBS opponent. UTSA pulled to within one score early in the final quarter when Zakhari Franklin went up high to grab a 32-yard touchdown pass from Narcisse. Hunter Duplessis' PAT made it 21-13 with 14:26 remaining.

The two teams traded possessions before BYU pushed its lead out to 27-13 on a 6-yard TD dash by Tyler Allgeier, who finished with 116 yards on 19 carries.

The Roadrunners raced right back down the field and made things interesting after Narcisse hit a wide-open Brennon Dingle on a 34-yard touchdown pass with 1:17 left to play.

UTSA then attempted an onside kick that the Cougars recovered. However, the Roadrunners forced a punting situation with fewer than 20 seconds left, but a roughing the punter penalty gave the ball back to BYU, which secured the win with one kneel-down.

Narcisse entered the contest late in the opening half and finished 17 of 20 through the air to lead the UTSA offense to a 359-yard output. The junior quarterback's favorite target was Franklin, who hauled in seven passes for 79 yards and the one TD. Brennon Dingle had four catches for 60 yards and a score, Joshua Cephus had four for 58 and Leroy Watson caught three for 49.

Charles Wiley posted six tackles, including one behind the line of scrimmage, and one quarterback pressure, while Antonio Parks and Kelechi Nwachuku had seven stops apiece.

SATURDAY, OCT. 17 Army 28, UTSA 16 San Antonio, Texas - Alamodome

SAN ANTONIO — Zakhari Franklin set a program record for receptions in a game, Sincere McCormick topped 100 rushing yards for the third time this season and Kelechi Nwachuku registered 16 tackles, but Army West Point used a potent ground attack to outlast UTSA 28-16 on Saturday afternoon at the Alamodome.

The Black Knights (5-1) gained 305 of their 358 yards on the ground and completed just one pass — a 53-yarder in the fourth quarter — to escape Military City USA with their second straight victory against the Roadrunners (3-3). Anthony Adkins led the way with 101 yards on just eight carries, while Tyhier Tyler added 95 yards on 19 totes for the visitors.

Meanwhile for UTSA, Franklin caught 12 passes for a career-high 138 yards and two touchdowns to eclipse the previous school standard for single-game receptions of 11 set by Greg Campbell Jr. in 2018. It marked the second 100-yard receiving game of his sophomore season and the third of his young career.

McCormick, who entered the game as the leading rusher in the FBS, carried 18 times for 133 yards to notch his sixth career 100-yard rushing game and help the Roadrunners tally 197 yards on the ground.

Nwachuku led all players with 16 tackles, including nine solo stops, to pace the Roadrunners defense. The sophomore from McAllen now stands in a tie for second on UTSA's single-game tackles chart.

Making his first start of the season, Lowell Narcisse completed 16 passes for 155 yards and a TD and also rushed for 47 before suffering an injury early in the fourth quarter. Facing fourth down and short at the Army 31 and staring at a 21-10 deficit, the junior quarterback rumbled up the middle for 20 yards to the 11 but was injured on the tackle. On the next play, Frank Harris hit Franklin on a fade route in the end zone for the wide receiver's second score of the day. The Black Knights blocked the extra-point attempt, leaving the score at 21-16.

SATURDAY, OCT. 24 UTSA 27, Louisiana Tech 26 San Antonio, Texas - Alamodome

SAN ANTONIO — Sincere McCormick registered his fourth 100-yard game of the season and UTSA held Louisiana Tech to 35 second-half yards in a 27-26, come-from-behind victory in Conference USA action on Saturday night at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners trailed by 13 points twice in the second half, but they piled up 269 yards of offense over the final 30 minutes and used a stingy defense to improve to 4-3 overall and 2-1 in league play and snap a six-game losing streak against the Bulldogs (3-3, 2-2).

LA Tech held a 26-20 lead with time winding down in the final frame before McCormick broke loose for a 45-yard dash up the middle to knot the score. Hunter Duplessis drilled the extra point to hand UTSA its first lead of the night at 27-26 with 6:16 remaining.

The Bulldogs had two more tries to reclaim the lead but the UTSA defense forced a punt and later sealed the win after Antonio Parks picked off a pass with under a minute remaining.

McCormick, a sophomore from Converse Judson, rushed for 165 yards and three touchdowns on a school-record 37 carries for his second straight and seventh career 100-yard performance on the ground. The nation's leading rusher tied another UTSA record with his three scores and upped his season yardage total to 867, which ranks fourth on the program's single-season list, and 1,850 for his career, good for third all-time.

Meanwhile, Rashad Wisdom posted 10 tackles to pace a defense that held the Bulldogs to 247 yards, the fewest allowed by the Roadrunners since surrendering 209 to UIW in the 2019 season opener. Parks had six stops and a forced fumble to go along with his interception, while Trevor Harmanson and Jamal Ligon turned in eight and seven tackles, respectively.

BOCA RATON, Fla. — Rashad Wisdom posted 13 tackles and the UTSA defense tied a school record with 14 tackles for loss, but Florida Atlantic used a strong running game and a stingy defense in a 24-3 victory in Conference USA action on Saturday at FAU Stadium.

The Owls rushed for 196 yards on the strength of Malcolm Davidson, who tallied 115 yards on 14 carries, and held the Roadrunners (4-4, 2-2) to 230 yards of offense in improving to 3-0 all-time against UTSA.

FAU built a 17-3 halftime lead and tacked on a touchdown late thanks to a short field to improve to 2-1 on the season. The Owls limited the Roadrunners to just 104 yards on the ground and 83 total yards in the second half.

Wisdom had nine solo stops and one tackle for loss as part of his team-high tackles total, while Charles Wiley logged eight tackles, including 3.5 behind the line of scrimmage to help UTSA match the program standard for single-game tackles for loss set in the season opener against Texas State.

The Owls built a 10-0 advantage in the opening quarter after Vladimir Rivas capped the opening drive with a 24-yard field goal and Aaron Young hauled in a 27-yard TD pass from Nick Tronti.

UTSA got on the board after Hunter Duplessis drilled a 49-yard field goal at the 8:55 mark of the second stanza.

FAU pushed its lead to 17-3 following a Tronti 2-yard QB keeper with two minutes left to play in the half.

The Roadrunners threatened to cut into the deficit after driving to the FAU 23 but time ran out on the visitors, leaving the margin at 14 points at the break.

UTSA took the opening possession of the second half into FAU territory but turned it over on downs.

From there, both defenses took control of the game as the two teams combined for only 174 second-half yards.

Frank Harris completed 12 passes for 109 yards and ran for 66, including a 50-yard dash in the opening half, while Joshua Cephus caught five passes for 63 yards to lead the receiving corps. Sincere McCormick rushed for 54 yards on 16 carries and now has 921 for the year, already the third-best season total in school history.

SATURDAY, NOV. 14 UTSA 52, UTEP 21 San Antonio, Texas - Alamodome

SAN ANTONIO — UTSA shattered the school record for total offense with 600 yards and the defense held UTEP to 71 yards as part of a second-half shutout in a 52-21 victory in Conference USA action on Saturday afternoon at the Alamodome.

Frank Harris registered his first career 300-yard passing performance, throwing for 312 yards and three touchdowns on 22-of-26 passing to help lead the Roadrunners (5-4, 3-2 C-USA) to their fifth win of the season, their most since winning six games in 2017. Brenden Brady rushed for a career-high 124 yards on 26 carries and Zakhari Franklin had six receptions for 118 yards and a score to help the offense eclipse the previous program standard of 569 yards set in the 2017 win against Texas State.

Meanwhile, the defense put the clamps on UTEP after halftime, surrendering 71 total yards, including only 14 on the ground, while holding the Miners (3-4, 0-3) off the scoreboard in the final 30 minutes. For the game, UTSA limited the visitors to 246 total yards and just 77 rushing yards, while forcing two turnovers in beating UTEP for the fourth straight time.

Rashad Wisdom led the way with nine tackles and a pair of forced fumbles, while Jamal Ligon added seven stops. Lorenzo Dantzler had 1.5 tackles for loss, including a sack, while Trumane Bell II and DeQuarius Henry also added sacks.

Holding a slim 24-21 advantage at halftime, UTSA exploded for four touchdowns over the final two quarters to run away from the Miners.

Tykee Ogle-Kellogg reached the end zone on a 15-yard pass play to help put the Roadrunners up 31-21 midway through the third quarter. That TD catch capped a nine-play, 80-yard drive that featured 26 rushing yards from Brady and a 19-yard reception by Joshua Cephus, who finished with 58 yards on five receptions.

SATURDAY, NOV. 21 UTSA 23, Southern Miss 20 Hattiesburg, Miss. - Roberts Stadium

HATTIESBURG, Miss. — Sincere McCormick broke the UTSA single-season rushing yardage record after piling up 173 yards on the ground to help lead UTSA to a 23-20 win over Southern Miss in Conference USA action on Saturday afternoon at Roberts Stadium.

McCormick's fifth 100-yard rushing output of the season highlighted the sixth win of head coach Jeff Traylor's first season at the helm of the Roadrunners, who improved to 6-4 overall and 4-2 in the conference while reaching six victories for the fifth time in the program's 10-year history and the first since 2017.

McCormick carried the ball 32 times and reached the end zone twice in eclipsing Jarveon Williams' previous school standard of 1,042 yards set in 2015. The sophomore from Converse Judson High School also tied Williams with his eighth career 100-yard performance and now has matched Jalen Rhodes' single-season rushing touchdowns mark of nine established in 2016. He also surpassed 2,000 yards on the ground with his 173-yard effort, as he now has 2,077 in just 21 games as a Roadrunner.

Trailing 10-9 at the half, UTSA put together back-to-back touchdown drives to take a 23-10 lead in the third quarter.

McCormick broke loose for a 69-yard touchdown dash on the opening drive of the second half that helped UTSA reclaim the lead. That run was a milestone setter, as it put the him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season and above the 2,000-yard for his career.

McCormick found pay dirt again later in the third quarter on a possession that was set up by Rashad Wisdom's third interception of the season. Brenden Brady had runs of 11, 6 and 9 yards to help set up McCormick's 1-yard TD plunge, which tied him atop UTSA's single-season rushing touchdowns chart.

SATURDAY, NOV. 28 UTSA 49, North Texas 17 San Antonio, Texas - Alamodome

SAN ANTONIO — UTSA broke school records for total offense and rushing yards in a game as part of a 49-17 victory over North Texas in Conference USA action on Saturday afternoon at the Alamodome.

The Roadrunners tallied 624 yards of offense and rode a ground game that churned out a school-record 443 yards to run their record to 7-4 overall and 5-2 in league play with the victory, which closed out a program-best 5-1 home slate this season. UTSA eclipsed the previous program standard for yards in a game of 600 set just two weeks against UTEP and also shattered the rushing yardage mark of 357 posted against Texas State in 2017.

Sincere McCormick led the rushing attack with 251 yards and a pair of touchdowns on 23 carries, bettering his own UTSA single-game rushing yardage record of 197 set in the season-opening win over Texas State. The sophomore running back averaged 10.9 yards per attempt in turning in his ninth career 100-yard game — also a school record — and moved into sole possession of the program's single-season rushing TDs mark with 11. He now leads the FBS with a school-record 1,345 rushing yards and with 2,328 career rushing yards, he has inched closer to Jarveon Williams' UTSA record of 2,393 yards.

Meanwhile, Frank Harris completed 19 of 24 passes for 144 yards and two TDs and the junior quarterback also registered his third career 100-yard rushing game with 113 yards and a score on six totes. It marked the first time two Roadrunners topped the century mark on the ground in the same game since McCormick and Lowell Narcisse against UTEP in 2019.

The UTSA defense held the high-powered Mean Green offense to 17 points in snapping a three-game losing skid to North Texas, which fell to 3-4 and 2-3.

Trevor Harmanson paced the unit with nine tackles, two quarterback hurries, one forced fumble and a pass breakup, while Kelechi Nwachuku contributed six stops and a PBU. Charles Wiley, Tyler Mahnke and Tariq Woolen registered five tackles apiece with Wiley adding one of the team's three sacks, along with Christian Clayton and Jaylon Haynes.

SATURDAY, DEC. 26 #16 Louisiana 31, UTSA 24 Dallas, Texas - Gerald J. Ford Stadium

DALLAS — Frank Harris passed for 208 yards and two touchdowns and ran for 91 yards and another score, but No. 16 Louisiana rode a strong ground game to hold on for a 31-24 victory in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl on Saturday at Gerald J. Ford Stadium.

Harris completed 13 of 21 passes to lead an offense that piled up 431 yards with 223 coming on the ground. Sincere McCormick totaled 122 yards on 23 carries to move back into the national lead with 1,467 rushing yards and also surpass Jarveon Williams' UTSA career rushing yardage record.

Meanwhile, Zakhari Franklin led all receivers with five catches for 115 yards and a TD — his fourth 100-yard game this season — to help UTSA (7-5) mount a wild comeback in the second half against the Ragin' Cajuns (10-1), who were led by Elijah Mitchell's 127 rushing yards.

Trailing 24-7 early in the third quarter, the Roadrunners reeled off 17 unanswered points to tie the game early in the fourth.

UTSA started the rally after turning a fumble that was forced by De'Marco Guidry and recovered by Trevor Harmanson at the 40-yard line into points. Harris had a 15-yard run that helped set up a 29-yard touchdown pass to Franklin. The Cedar Hill High School product's seventh TD catch of the season helped pull the Roadrunners back to within 10.

The Harris-to-Franklin connection worked again on the Roadrunners' next possession, as the two hooked up for a 52-yard pass play that helped set up a 10-yard TD pass from Harris to Joshua Cephus, which pulled the sophomore into a tie atop the program's single-season receptions list. Duplessis' PAT made it 24-21 with 4:09 left in the third.

Duplessis split the uprights from 20 yards early in the fourth to knot the score at 24-all. The senior's 17th field goal of the year capped a nine-play, 82-yard march that was keyed by a 29-yard run from McCormick that put the sophomore from Converse Judson over the century mark for the seventh time this season and 10th for his career.

Louisiana reclaimed the lead midway through the final frame on a 1-yard TD plunge by Trey Ragas. The PAT made it 31-24 with 7:16 left to play.

UTSA made its way into Louisiana territory once again, but facing a 4th-and-7 at the 35 with 4:40 left, an incomplete pass turned it over on downs.

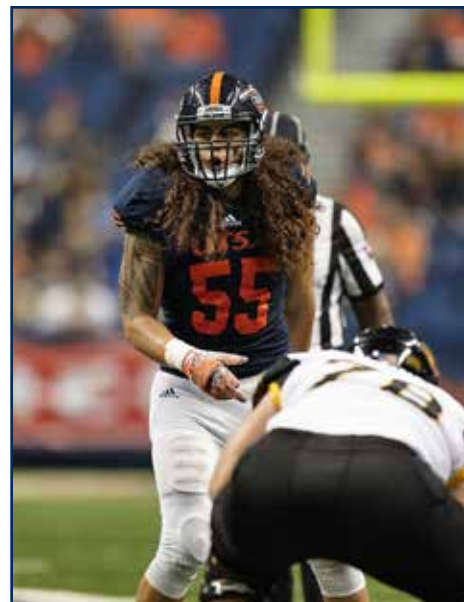

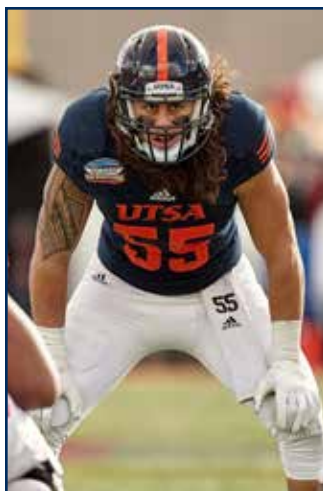
